



ALISON GOY - One Player, Five Questions

Interviewed by Aubrey Waddy

Alison Goy is an England international squash player, but unlike many with lots of achievements, she's not one for her statistics. An obvious question, "How many times have you been picked for the Home Internationals?" A pause. "Oh I guess at around five times. I've played at every (home internationals) location. Five or six. I should know the answer."

"I should know the answer." But when we talked, she couldn't recall. Neither did she remember exactly when she was first selected for England. After checking, she told me that her first international was in 2012, and that she's played in seven in all, so far. (The 'so far' is mine.)

But she did remember her first international weekend, for the o-40s, at the Fitzwilliam Club in Dublin, a splendid multisport club many GB Vets members will be familiar with. It was an entirely appropriate place for Alison's debut. As background: one of her other sports, before she concentrated on squash, was badminton. In badminton, you play doubles. After the doubles, you have tea and biscuits. With squash, you play singles. Afterwards you go down to the pub! Tea and biscuits would surely have been available at the Fitzwilliam Club, but it's more notable for the Guinness and the craíc in the bars.

Alison was good at sport from a young age. She captained netball at school, playing goal attack, and for two or three seasons the same team carried on in the local Newark league, sponsored by her Dad! She first played hockey for the ladies' team at the Paviors Hockey Club in Nottingham at the age of twelve. This led to more than fifteen years of hockey in the Midlands League until finally the difficulty of giving up whole weekends to play, on top of the mid-week training, became too much. From then on she focussed on squash.

Alison first played squash when she was sixteen, answering an ad for juniors in the local paper. Of the ten or twelve teenagers who started at the same time, four went on to play for the Grove club. How many clubs would die for that now. After only two years she was picked for team squash in the Notts league. She also played in the men's fifth team at the Grove club. Sadly, the Notts Ladies league folded some years ago, but Alison has always been a great one for team squash.

She was introduced to England Squash Masters by Adrian Wright and Dave Hardern, with the promise, 'You'll get some good matches.' So she entered the Pontefract event that year, and at the next, in Exeter, was "taken under the wing" of Ian Bradburn and Glen Ragou. That sounds like make or break, and unsurprisingly with a character like Alison, make it undoubtedly was. "I've never looked back." However, it's not the squash itself that defines the person. Stating the obvious for the many players and others who enjoy Alison's company, she says, "I like to socialise. I don't mind helping out. Every club I've played at I've been captain or fixtures secretary or something." That accords with the impression you always get when you see Alison at a tournament. At GB Vets and Masters events you'll find her organising and contributing and helping out in some way, as well as playing. And if you ever need someone to enjoy a beer with afterwards, Alison will be the perfect choice!

In 2013/2014 Alison was nominated as one of the three England Squash Masters Players of the Year. "Not for my squash abilities!" she says. That will be untrue, but she was instrumental in establishing the successful relationship between ESM and iPROSPORTS, and she was for some years the longest standing female member on an ESM committee.

There's an enormous amount of admin associated with GB Vets and England Squash Masters. Everyone who has represented England in the Home Internationals will have had to deal with this as the event approaches: confirming attendance; plus or minus a partner; place(s) for the dinner; bookings for other meals; hotel reservations, (and paying for the privilege of representing your country!) Someone has to coordinate everything for ESM, covering seventy or eighty players each year. No surprise that the organiser-in-chief for several years was Alison. "I did used to enjoy it, but for three months it's crazy." She only stopped when caring for her elderly parents took precedence. It's characteristic of Alison that she has joined a number of GB Vets tours, including ones to Jersey and Gibraltar. In May this year she will be going, for the third time, to the Barbados Open, with Polly Woodward. She mentions previous visits to what she refers to as a little shack of a club in Hastings, Barbados, with "the tiniest bar", with Ian Bradburn, Geoff Redfern and Andrea Santamaria. This year it will or won't be solid preparation for the World Masters in Amsterdam in August! For Amsterdam it's no surprise to hear that a number of UK players have sought advice from Alison about hotels. She has competed several times at the Worlds, in Birmingham and Hong Kong and Charlottesville.

You'd think that all the involvement in squash, plus Alison's day job in Nottingham in Customer Services for Calyx, a large company that manages pharmaceutical research, would exclude everything else. However, she has another passion. Her Dad was an accomplished footballer, and a devoted Nottingham Forest supporter. So Alison is also a devoted fan... of Liverpool Football Club! The devotion started, presumably in rebellion, in the Bob Paisley era. Kenny Dalglish was among the posters that adorned the young Alison's bedroom wall, and she's made many trips to Anfield. She even shares a birthday with the great Dalglish. She did start playing football herself, with Newark Town Ladies, but fortunately for her squash career, an early, painful, dead leg put her off. So her knees and ankles are probably in better shape than they might have been if she'd achieved as much at football as in her various other sports.

Here are Alison's five questions.

1. Who was the best player you ever played?

I had the fortune of playing Donna Vardy after she had finished playing on the tour. I think it's the only time I've lost 27-0! Donna was a fantastic player, but I feel that Millie Tomlinson is probably the best player I've ever played although she was only about 13 at the time, I lost 3-0 but at least I managed to get some points on the board.

2. What did it feel like the first time you were picked for England?

It was just a really proud moment. I'd represented my county in Hockey & Squash but to be representing your country is just something else, something that I never saw as a possible achievement.

3. What was your hardest match?

One match that stands out for me was a Nottingham Squash Club Ladies Championship semi-final match against Sue Pynegar. Prior to this match I had never beaten Sue. In fact I had never been close to beating Sue. So at 2-0 down and 8-1 down in the third (HIHO scoring) things were not looking good. To this day I still do not know how I managed to turn it around, but I did and in doing so Sue was no longer my nemesis!

4. What are you most proud of in your squash career?

Captaining the England team. I've been captain 4 times. My proudest moment was when I captained England in Nottingham (my home club) and my Dad came to watch. He had never watched me play before and I had a five set battle with the late Fiona McClean, narrowly losing the fifth. Even though Scotland took the title it was just a really special moment as I could see how proud he was. And having never played squash in his life he told me exactly where I'd gone wrong afterwards!

Fifth question, chosen by Alison:

5. If I was 16 again and read the same advertisement, would I take up squash?

Most definitely. I have travelled all over the world because of squash and met some fantastic people of which many are now good friends.

GB VETS VS WALES BRIDGEND 9 MARCH

APART FROM PLAYING SQUASH I ALSO...

DO SINGING

At last November's Festival of Squash at the Royal Automobile Club in Epsom I was talking to our local Epsom member, James Dubois, and asked him about the rumours of his singing exploits and he confessed to the following:

I never sang in my school choir because Choir Practice coincided with teatime and, due to my sweet tooth (that I still have), I wasn't passingup on the sticky buns. So it was not until almost forty years later that I saw a Men's Barbershop Chorus on television. They looked so jolly and sounded superb and a few weeks later I casually turned-up at the Annual Barbershop Convention in Bournemouth. I was allowed to sing in a Masterclass, on stage with 200 men, and the four- part close harmonies had me hooked: after that, I rehearsed weekly with a local Chorus ending up at Windsor where we have regularly won National medals, the best of which was a Silver Medal, about ten years ago. I still don't read music and play no instruments, so I rely on teach-tapes and my memory to learn the correct notes and words. For me, the real challenge is to sing in a quartet, usually four men but sometimes a mixed quartet - you need to be rock solid with your notes, words and timing as all performing is without

sheet music and no musical instruments: you're on your own and I'm the only Bass. That involves a lot of practice at home and then more synchronised singing with the other three voice parts. My first quartet public performance was at a National Trust property in Surrey about twenty-five years ago. I forgot to mention to the Organiser that we'd never sung in public, but it went (fairly) well and we earned £100 for four evenings of work, split between the four of us—about £1.25 per hour. We were ecstatic when a woman chased after us and asked where she could buy a recording of our quartet songs!

Quartets are like marriages, but more complicated because four people all have different aspirations and various work and other family commitments, so I've sung in several quartets over the past twenty-five years. My current quartet, The Royal Males were placed seventh in the National Quartet Contest in 2009 and also won The Gold Medal for the Seniors category with a minimum combined age of 240. As National Champions we qualified to represent the UK in the World Championships held in 2010 in Tampa, Florida. That was a brilliant fortnight. We didn't really compare to the US quartets as they all sing from the age of 18 in College, but it was a wonderful experience with lots of singing and camaraderie.

The Royal Males are still performing together and even had four events in the six weeks before Christmas in 2023. It is a sensational feeling to entertain others and so many of our audiences have never heard the chords and harmonies that we produce. That gives us a real buzz and, I'm told, prolongs active life aiding lung capacity, posture, mental acuity, performance skills and general alertness — in many ways, a bit like squash!
